CREATE YOUR "ELEVATOR PITCH"



As you progress in the professional world, you should be able to tell a **crisp, clear, interesting story about yourself and your experience.** By having this information prepared, you will be able to create a positive and lasting impression and you may open doors for future conversations or opportunities. The goal is to have people think positively of you if you are pursuing a professional opportunity or to keep you in mind when they hear of an opportunity that matches your skills and interests.

The "Elevator Pitch" is your introduction to someone in *any professional situation* and can contain different information depending on the situation in which you are meeting with someone (e.g., shadowing a Grinnell alum, introductions before a meeting or interview, encounter with a scholar in your field at a conference, conversation at a reception for a speaker, an actual elevator ride with a professional whose work you're interested in, etc.). Imagine yourself in an elevator with the head of a top-notch organization in your field of interest. You have 30-60 seconds to impress them by describing your research and sharing the skills you've gained related to your field of interest.

Where do you begin (after the handshake)?

Tailor your pitch to the situation, but include these basic points in those 30-60 seconds:

- Who you are (name, major, class year)
- Relevant work experience
- Relevant extracurricular activities/accomplishments
- Area of interest, type of experience you are looking for
- Leading question about the company, position, next steps

Name, Major, Class Year (e.g., "Hi, my name is Avery Smith and I am a Sociology major at Grinnell College. I'll be graduating in May 2024).

Your relevant work experience (e.g., Last summer I volunteered for a nonprofit organization where I supported the needs of recent U.S. immigrants by communicating with them in both English and Spanish, organized materials to highlight appropriate resources, and collaborated with my supervisor to plan a fundraising campaign.)

Relevant extracurricular activities/accomplishments (e.g., In addition to my past experience and my coursework at Grinnell, I have been very involved in the African and Caribbean Student Union on campus.)

Area of interest, type of experience you are looking for (e.g., Since my nonprofit volunteer experience this summer, I have had an interest in exploring how other nonprofit organizations cater to communities in ways that support their needs without imposing colonialist viewpoints, and I have heard that your organization provides opportunities to do this for undergraduate students.)

Leading question about the company, position, next steps (keeps the conversation going) (e.g., What skills would you like to see students demonstrate before applying for these opportunities?)
